Behaviour Gems:

What are houses & house points?

House points form our whole school reward system here at Livingstone Academy. They encourage a team ethos across the school and allow children of all ages to have a common goal. Every child, from Reception through to Year 2, belongs to a house: Kilgarvan (red), Egremont (blue), Ashtone (green) and Lanark (yellow). Each house also has teachers allocated to them.

How are house points earned?

House points are given out as a recognition of achievement by individual children. They include::

- Demonstration of our learning behaviours: **Self-Worth, Engagement and Purpose.**
- Demonstration of our behaviour values:

At Livingstone Academy, we are:

- * Respectful- being polite to those around them, for example holding doors open for others, looking after our environment, using their please and thank you's and listening to others.
- ★ Safe- walking safely and silently around the building, when lining up as well as during playtimes, lunchtimes and assemblies.
- ★ Ready to learn- putting up their hand in class, wearing their smart uniform with pride, offering suggestions and trying their best in lessons. Showing dedication and commitment towards their learning within their books, home learning and school projects.
- ★ Kind- going above and beyond to show kindness to others, supporting both their peers and teachers.







Individual achievement

The number of house points that children earn will also be rewarded with milestone certificates during our whole school achievement assembly at the end of every term:

100 house points = Bronze

200 house points = Silver

300 house points = Gold

We are really excited to share with you our behaviour 'House Point' and 'Gem' achievement posters which the children see up and around our school. Please scan the QR code and talk about our behaviour posters at home with your children to celebrate their successes.





Celebrating Differences:

What have we been up to this term?

Reception:

We have had a very busy and productive second half term in reception. Having established our routines in September, we were able to fully explore the topic of 'Space'. We began by finding a spaceship that had crashed onto our school roof! We were also visited by a science dome, which projected images of space all around us. The children have been inspired and we now have many budding astronauts and astronomers.

We marked special days and events, including visitors to teach us about Diwali, All Saints Eve and BCP Road Safety. We noticed the children's awareness of being safe around the roads increased and they used the words STOP, LOOK, LISTEN and THINK when crossing the road.







To develop the children's communication and language skills, we have introduced 'Word of the day' and 'Poem of the week' - the children have really embraced this and can be heard practising their new language throughout the day.

For the final two weeks, we have turned our attention to Christmas. We have learnt the Christmas story and have also compared what and how people celebrate Christmas around the world. We have loved practising and sharing with you our Christmas performance.















Year I:

Year I has had a fun-filled and incredibly busy half term, and we are so proud of the children's achievements. The children have continued to apply themselves to their learning, show a real zest for learning and positively access their learning by showing a growth mindset.

In English, we have linked our learning to 'Lost in the Toy Museum' whereby the children sequenced the events, and wrote sentences that included time adverbials and specific verbs. The children wowed us in their independent writing, whereby they wrote to inform, explaining how to play 'Hide and Seek' using their learnt knowledge.



In maths, the children have been learning about addition and subtraction. We have been learning about part-whole models, number bonds, first, then and now number sentences, and written number sentences. The children thoroughly enjoy the challenge in maths, and are always eager to extend their own learning.



In history, the children have been learning about past and present, using timelines to understand the order of events. We



have looked closely at our school, Livingstone Academy, and what the buildings were before they became a school. We took a tour around the school building and identified areas which were 'old' and 'new'. We enjoyed looking at the stained glass windows and the courtrooms. We studied the Old Fire Station and



equipment and uniforms from hundreds of years ago compared to now. We were incredibly lucky to be joined by one of the local fire stations who showed

us their fire engine, key pieces of kit and answered our questions. Mrs Joiner even got to try on the uniform!

The children were so proud to share their books with you during parents evening. The hard work and dedication of your children is so evident. Merry Christmas! Have a lovely break and see you in 2024!







Year 2:

The children have been learning about the Wright Brothers in history this term, discovering the world's first successful piloted engine-powered aeroplane - The Wright Flyer. We have been looking at the similarities and differences between 1900 and present day. The children have used pictures, stories, and the internet to find out about the past; and learnt about the era of modern aviation and the past adventures which the brothers inspired after their creation in 1903. In English, the children have been focusing on writing to entertain whilst exploring the Fairy Tale - Rumpelstiltskin. Over the past few weeks, the children have used their imagination to change the ending of the story by using different noun phrases, compound sentences, exclamation sentences. I'm sure you also noticed your child's incredible pre-cursive handwriting whilst looking through their book at Parents' Evening. We have now completed each letter in the alphabet and will be continuing to practise this skill in the Spring Term.

Earlier in the term, the children looked incredibly smart for their school photos (some children were busy having their sibling photos at the time this was taken so we have a few missing faces in this photo).

As I am sure you will agree, our Yr I and 2 children provided a show stopping performance at our Christmas Carol service this week. They worked incredibly hard to learn the songs shared and we are enormously proud of them all.

We would like to wish our wonderful Livingstone Families a restful Christmas break, and a Happy New Year! We look forward to more learning and new memories to come in 2024.

Reading Books

At the beginning of next term, we will be sending further hard copies of our 'Little Wandle' reading scheme books home. To protect the books, we will send them home in a plastic popper wallet along with your child's reading record. We ask that you don't put your child's water bottle in their bookbag as they can often leak and ruin our books. Please ensure this book is returned each morning in your child's school bag. This book cannot remain at home because it needs to be read at school each day.







If books are not returned, on the first occasion your child will receive a reminder slip. If books are not returned after two occasions then we will require a payment to cover the cost of replacing the book. However, if books are still not returned after three occasions, physical books will no longer be sent home and will instead be replaced with our Collins ebooks.

In addition, please note that on a Friday your child will not have their Little Wandle book in their book bag as we will collect these in and give you a picture book called a 'share book' for you to read as a family over the weekend. You are already familiar with this routine as these books are sent home to promote reading for pleasure; they are chosen by the children and can be used as a bedtime story.

Finally, please record your child's reading in their reading journal. It is important that you listen to your child read every day for at least 10 minutes. Like the Little Wandle books, it is vital that the reading journals remain in your child's bag each day as the teachers mark these weekly to check progress.
