Reception- Terrific Tales

Driving question: How can we as storytellers create a new story for others to enjoy?

Reception Curriculum Goals:

- In this topic, we are learning to:
 - Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important;
 - Listen to and talk about stories to build familiarity and understanding;
 - Retell the story once we have developed a deep familiarity with the text;
 - Form lower case letters correctly;
 - Spell words by identifying the sounds and then writing the sound with letters;
 - Blend sounds into words so that we can read short words, simple phrases and sentences;
 - Reread stories to build up confidence in word reading, fluency and our understanding and enjoyment

Key questions

- Why is it important to listen during storytime?
- Can you tell me what this story is about?
- Who are the main characters in this story and where is this story set?
- Can you retell this story to me? What happened at the beginning of the story?
- What happened in the middle of the story?
- How did the story end?

What can you do at home to help?

How can you take care of it?

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

